SPEAKERS

1. Introduction, Prof. Dr. Ellen Rutten

ELLEN RUTTEN is professor of Literature (with a focus on Slavonic literature and culture) at the University of Amsterdam. She is one of the founding editors of the online academic journal *Digital Icons: Studies in Russian, Eurasian and Central European New Media*. Her research interests include post-Soviet and global contemporary culture, literature and art, social media, and memory discourse. Rutten has just finalized a HERA research project on what she calls "web wars": discussions of the Soviet past in post-socialist social media. The Web Wars team recently published the edited volume *Memory, Conflict and New Media: Web Wars in Post-Socialist States* (Routledge 2013), and is currently preparing a film on media and remembering in Ukraine. Rutten is also finalizing a book on post-Soviet sincerity rhetoric; she currently examines imperfection aesthetics in creative practices.

2. Lecture *Early Modern Foundations of Ukrainian Identity: The Political Culture of Cossack Ukraine*, Prof. Dr. Zenon E. Kohut

ZENON E. KOHUT is professor of history at the University of Alberta and director of the Kowalsky Program for the Study of Eastern Ukraine at the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies. Between 1994 and 2012, Dr. Kohut was the director of the Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies. Before coming to the University in 1992, he served as a senior research analyst at the Library of Congress and editor of the *American Bibliography of Slavic and East European Studies*. A long-time associate of the Ukrainian Research Institute at Harvard University, Dr. Kohut received his Ph.D. in history from the University of Pennsylvania and has taught at Michigan State University, the University of Alberta, and Yale University. He is a specialist in the history of Ukraine, Ukrainian-Russian relations, and questions of early-modern political culture and identity. He is the author of *Russian Centralism and Ukrainian Autonomy: Imperial Absorption of the Hetmanate* (1988, Ukrainian translation 1996) and many articles on Ukrainian history. Dr. Kohut's collection of articles *Korinnia identychnosti: Studii z rann'omodernoï ta modernoi istorii Ukraïny* (Roots of Identity: Studies in the Early Modern and Modern History of Ukraine) was published in Kyiv in 2004. He is the co-author of the *Historical Dictionary of Ukraine* (2005, revised edition 2013) and his *Making Ukraine: Studies on Political Culture, Historical Narrative, and Identity* was published in 2011.

3. Lecture *Borderland Ukraine: stuck between the European Union and the Russian Federation*, Dr. Nienke de Deugd

NIENKE DE DEUGD is Assistant Professor at the Department of International Relations & International Organization of the University of Groningen, the Netherlands. Her research focuses on European integration and transition processes in Central and Eastern Europe; with a particular focus on the European Union's Eastern Partnership and Ukraine. She has the following publications on Ukraine: Deugd, N. de (2012). Easier said than done. Ukraine as part of the European Union's ring of friends. *Studia Diplomatica*, LXV(2), 29-41; Deugd, N. de (2012). *Liever nabije buur dan verre vriend: samenwerking tussen Oekraïne en Rusland*. *Internationale Spectator*, 66(1), 18-20.

4. Presentation: *Identity of European Cities: Amsterdam, Kiev, and Berlin in Expressionist Poetry* (a comparative literary approach), Drs. Tetiana Mykhalchuk

TETIANA MYKHALCHUK is an affiliated researcher at OGC/ ICON at Utrecht University and an external PhD candidate at Duitsland Instituut Amsterdam, University of Amsterdam. Her research is on European identity and literary expressionisms. Her areas of expertise include theory, history, and comparative literature and culture with focus on European modernism, avant-garde, transnationalism, and reconciliation. Mykhalchuk has studied Ukrainian Philology at Nizhyn University and Theory, History, and Comparative literature at National University of Kyiv-Mohyla Academy and graduated cum laude from both universities. The results of her research are partly presented in recently published books on European identities and cities: *Discourses of European Expressionisms: The Image of the City in Expressionist Poetry of Twenty-Seven Countries*. Volume I (February, 2014) and *Reconciliation of East and West: German Mediations of Expressionist Scholarships after 1973* (March, 2014). She is finalizing the forthcoming Volume II *Ukrainian and Dutch Expressionism*. Mykhalchuk is also a translator and a member of the board of directors (bestuurslid) at *Platform Stichting Samenwerking Nederland – Oekraïne*.

5. Lecture *Overcoming Borders in a Borderland - Christian Churches in Ukraine and Their Mutual Relations since 1991*, Prof. Dr. Alfons Brüning

ALFONS BRÜNING is an endowed professor (bijzonder hoogleraar) Orthodoxy and Peace Studies at Free University and PThU Amsterdam. Since March 2007 he is also assistant professor and staff member of the Institute of Eastern Christian Studies at Nijmegen University. He studied Slavic Philology, East European and European History at the Universities of Münster and Freiburg. Since 1996 he was PhD candidate at the Osteuropa-Institut of Freie Universität Berlin, and part time assistant at the publishing house Herder, Freiburg, involved in a large dimensioned book project on the history of Christianity. In 2005 he received his PhD at Freie Universität Berlin. Between 2005 and february 2007 he was assistant professor at the Ecumenical Institute of the university of Münster (Germany). Alfons Brüning's special interest is devoted to the history of church and culture of the European Christian East since the Early Modern period, particularly of Russia and the borderland region between Eastern and Western Christianity, on the territory of present Lithuania, Belarus and especially Ukraine.

6. Lecture *From Fear to Dignity: Youth, Church and Society on the Maidan and on the Move*, Dr. Borys Gudziak

Bishop BORYS GUDZIAK, Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church, Head of the Department of External Church Relations, Eparch of Paris, President of the Ukrainian Catholic University of Lviv. Bishop Borys Gudziak since January 2013 serves as Eparch (diocesan bishop) of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Eparchy (diocese) of Paris with responsibility for Ukrainian Greek Catholics in France, Belgium, Netherland, Luxemburg, and Switzerland. He also is head of the Department for External Relations of the Ukainian Greek Catholic Church. Bishop Borys was born in 1960, in Syracuse, New York. His parents had come to New York from the Lviv region in the early 1950s. He graduated from Syracuse University, obtaining a dual degree in philosophy and biology in 1980. He entered the Saint Sophia College at the Ukrainian Catholic University in Rome where, as a seminarian for the Lviv Archeparcy, he attended the Pontifical Urban University. In 1983, he graduated in theology and began doctoral studies in Slavic and Byzantine Cultural History at Harvard University, where he received his Ph.D. in 1992. In connection with his research and church activity he lived in the Ukrainian SSR and in communist Poland for extended periods of time in 1988-1990. His thesis, *Crisis and Reform: The Kievan Metropolitanate, the Patriarchate of Constantinople, and the Genesis of the Union of Brest*, was published by Harvard in 1998, and subsequently appeared in Ukrainian and Polish (a French version is in preparation). In 1995, he completed a licentiate in Eastern Christian Studies at the Pontifical Oriental Institute (Rome), examining in particular the neo-patristic synthesis of Orthodox theologian Georges Florovsky. In 1992, Gudziak moved to Lviv where he founded the Institute of Church History, serving as director until 2002. In 1993, he was appointed head of the Commission for the Renewal of the Lviv Theological Academy with responsibility for developing a Catholic university. He was ordained a priest in 1998 in Lviv and in his life and ministry is close to the mentally handicapped. From 1995, he was Vice Rector and from 2000, Rector of the Lviv Theological Academy, which in 2002 became the Ukrainian Catholic University. He subsequently served as rector of UCU (2002-2013). Presently he is president (head of the Senate or board of directors) of the UCU, the only Catholic university in the territory of the former Soviet Union. UCU has played a major role in educational reform and social change in contemporary Ukraine. Bishop Borys is the author of over 50 scholarly works in church and cultural history and on the topic of historical methodology and educational innovation. He is an active media commentator on topics of ecclesial and social affairs.

7. Presentation *Right for Self-expression and Self-determination of Minorities in Ukraine: A Perspective on Inter-cultural/religious Education*, Drs. Vitaliy V. Proshak

VITALIY V. PROSHAK is a guest PhD researcher in Constitutional Dialogue, Human Rights and Freedom of Religion at the Tilburg Graduate School of Law, Tilburg University. He was affiliated researcher at the Faculty of Humanities, Utrecht University and Erasmus School of Law, Erasmus University Rotterdam. In 2012-2013 he coordinated the implementation of intercultural education *Face to Faith School Program* of the Tony Blair Faith Foundation in school curriculum in Ukraine. He holds (cum laude) MA *Christianity and Society* from Tilburg School of Catholic Theology, Tilburg University. In addition to other publications, his recently published books include *From Civil Spring to Democratic Summer: Constitution, Human Rights and Freedom of Religion in Eurasia* (forthcoming, 2014), *Religious Education in Multicultural Society* (2014) and *Juridical Foundation to Religious Education in the post-Soviet Eastern European State* (2012).

8. Lecture *One or More Ukraines?* Dr. Marc Jansen

MARC JANSEN (1946) studied history at University of Amsterdam. Until 2011 assistant professor of Russian and East European Studies there, since then guest researcher. Formerly also employed by Dutch Research Organization NWO, University of Utrecht, and International Institute of Social History, Amsterdam. Author of *A show trial under Lenin* (The Hague 1982; Russ. transl. Moscow 1993) and other books and articles on Russian and Soviet history and politics. Most recent book in English biography of Stalin's state security chief N.I. Ezhov (co-authored by Nikita Petrov), *Stalin's loyal executioner: People's Commissar Nikolai Ezhov, 1895-1940* (Stanford, Cal. 2002, Russian ed. 2008). In Dutch *Grensland: Een geschiedenis van Oekraïne* (Amsterdam 2014). Regularly appearing for media as specialist on Russia and other post-Soviet countries. During several years lived and worked in Moscow, travelling to many parts of Russia and other former Soviet countries. On behalf of OSCE observed parliamentary and presidential elections in Russia, Ukraine, Georgia, Kazakhstan, and Kyrgyzstan during 1993-2013.

9. Lecture *HOLODOMOR and GORTA MÓR: Famines, Historiographies and Identities in Ukraine and Ireland*, Dr. Christian Noack

CHRISTIAN NOACK has studied Eastern European History, Media Studies and Slavonic Studies at the University of Cologne. His PhD thesis (2000) was devoted to "National Movement and Nation-Building among the Muslims of the Russian Empire. He taught Eastern European History at the University of Bielefeld, Germany (2000-2007) and the National University of Ireland, Maynooth (2007-2011). He is associate professor for Eastern European Studies at the Universiteit van Amsterdam since August 2011. His research is focused on the past and present of Muslims and other Minorities in Russia and Central Asia, the cultural and social history of the late Soviet period and the representations of history and collective memories across Europe.

10. Presentation *Identity, Memory and New Media: Inventing the History of Ukraine in Wikipedia*, Drs. Mykola Makhortykh

MYKOLA MAKHORTYKH studied History and Euroculture in Kyiv, Krakow and Göttingen. Currently he is a PhD Candidate at the University of Amsterdam and one of editors of the online academic journal Digital Icons: Studies in Russian, Eurasian and Central European New Media His research deals with the World-War-II memory in Ukraine and how it is affected by processes of de-Sovietization, nationalization, and digitization that the country is currently undergoing. In the recent years he was actively involved in activities of the International Spring School Digital Mnemonics in Slavonic Studies and gave a number of presentations concerning the impact of various media platforms on commemoration of the Second World War.

11. Presentation *Revolution of Remembrance*, Maartje Gerretsen

MAARTJE GERRETSEN (1977) is a documentary maker based in Amsterdam. During her studies in Literary Theory at the VU University Amsterdam she developed a special interest in (post-)Soviet culture, and simultaneously started to make radio documentaries for the VPRO, a Dutch public broadcast company. Among others she made the documentary *Reasons to live* about the contemporary literary life in Moscow, and *The Russian Schizo-Revolution* on non-conformist art in St. Petersburg. Currently Gerretsen is working on several film projects, including *Revolution of Remembrance* (working title). This documentary is being developed within the research project *Web Wars: Digital Diasporas and the Language of Memory in Russia & Ukraine*, of the University of Bergen, Norway. It tells the story of two young Ukrainians who dedicate their lives to the commemoration of the past -- the unofficial Ukrainian history versus the official Soviet history.

12. Concluding remarks, Prof. Dr. Rob van der Laarse

ROB VAN DER LAARSE is research director of the Amsterdam School for Heritage and Memory Studies (ASHMS) at the UvA's faculty of humanities and theme leader European Identity and Culture of ACCESS EUROPE. He studied history and anthropology at the same university, where he graduated cum laude and obtained his PhD cum laude in humanities (1989). His published dissertation on the crucial role of religion in the modernization and symbolic construction of political communities in the 19th C. Netherlands was awarded a Praemium Erasmianum research prize (1990). He held positions and visiting scholarships at different universities in history, media and cultural studies, was founding director of the MA heritage studies at the UvA (2004-2010), and currently teaches at the art and cultural sciences departments of the UvA as well as VU University Amsterdam, where he holds the Westerbork chair of War and Conflict Heritage. In 2012-2013 he was fellow and theme group leader at the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study (NIAS) in Wassenaar, and project leader of the international Terrorscape research group, which was recently awarded with the Euromediterraneo Prize 2013.
